Addressing Resistance

- · Agency level
- · Individual level





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Agency Level Resistance

- · Leadership
 - Executive Director
 - Board
 - Staff
- · Not traditional demographic
- · Challenges partnering with corrections



Individual Level Resistance

- Fears
 - Fear for own safety
 - Fear/discomfort serving men
 - Discomfort serving someone whose crime is related to sexual violence
 - Discomfort going to correctional facility
 - Unsure how to serve/what resources are available



Possible Solutions to Resistance

- · Focus on serving survivors
 - WA State shared beliefs:
 - No one deserves to be raped
 - People who experience sexual assault while incarcerated should have access to comprehensive confidential advocacy services
- · Acknowledge some inherent hesitancies
- · Work to educate yourself, staff, and Board
 - Training
 - Tour facilities

Designated RCC Personnel

- Who will be advocates responding to PREA calls from your agency?
 - All staff and volunteer advocates
 - Staff certain responses; volunteers others
 - All staff and sub-group of volunteers
 - Sub-group of staff and volunteers
- Helpful to provide PREA-specific training to anyone who will be responding
- May involve creating a separate PREA "on call" list





 - Also helpful for advocate education



 - Trust your expertise

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Common Advocate Questions

- · Logistics
 - How will we be contacted?
 - · Collect calls
 - · When should we expect calls?
 - Will hosp or prison be calling for accompaniment?
 - What resources are available within the facility?
 - Physical space limitations
 - Books, music, art supplies
 - Staff options (PSP, mental health, medical, counselor)
 - Programs



Common Advocate Questions

- · What Ifs:
 - Survivor is in prison for a sexual offense?
 - Survivor expresses suicidal or homicidal ideation?
 - Survivor is prank caller or off topic?
 - Various scenarios



Before You Train

- · Review hospital response protocol
- · Tour facility & hospital exam space
- Learn about facility policies and protocols:
 - Medical and mental health services available
 - Helpful to get familiar with staff so you can point survivor in right direction
 - Confidentiality of various services
 - Process for hospital visit
 - Role of PSP and PCM
